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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Ann Devlin

On a recent, beautiful summer day, SAVE members, family, and friends went on an adventure to Boston Harbor to visit Spectacle Island. We had great fun, learned a few things about this island so close to us but one that few of us had visited, and only wish that more of our members were able to join us that day.

For those of you unfamiliar with all of the Boston Harbor islands, Spectacle Island is situated some 4 miles offshore of downtown Boston, a short 15 minute ferry ride. The island has a varied history, and today is a public park, forming part of the Boston Harbor Islands National Recreation Area. The island features a marina, a "green" visitor center with exhibits about the history and evolution of the island, a café, a life-guarded swimming beach, and five miles of walking trails that lead to the crest of a 157 foot-high hill (the tallest hill on the Boston Harbor Islands) which offers gorgeous panoramic views of the harbor, the other islands, and the City of Boston.

Spectacle Island has a varied history that included farming, a quarantine hospital, a glue factory, resort hotels and a garbage dump. The island was initially composed of two small drumlins connected by a spit. Beginning in the 1920s and extending until 1959, deposition of the city's garbage expanded the size and the island by 36 acres. After closure as a dump, the island remained a smelly, toxic blight in the middle of Boston Harbor until 1992, when it was redeveloped and served as the receiving ground for excavated material from the Central Artery/Third Harbor Tunnel Project. The island was then resurfaced with clay and topsoil, terraced with retaining walls, had deciduous and conifer trees--as well as meadow grasses--planted trails and buildings built, and a beach installed. The island reopened to the public in 2006 and is now part of the 34-island Boston Harbor Islands National Park Area managed by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR).

SAVE members wanted to visit the island to see first-hand this wonderful example of "green" technology and reclamation. It was a fantastic experience! We explored the island, seeing many beautiful butterflies, birds, and wildlife (one of our members saw a wild turkey and a beaver), and just enjoyed ourselves immensely.

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One of our long-time members, Joyce Rodenhiser, summed our trip up perfectly as follows:

Riding with friends and sea breezes for 20 minutes, enjoying a ride up to the top of the drumlin, sitting with friends, having Brie, dark chocolate cupcakes, walking through fields of wildflowers and butterflies and bees, conversing with SAVE friends, experiencing the visitor's center with exhibits and foods and lavs, seeing folks swim and boat and fish in clean water, finding pavilions with fresh water and seating, wishing all our SAVE friends could be there, Such was Spectacle Island!

SAVE's trip to Spectacle Island exceeded all expectations!

LIVE OWL PROGRAM!

COME SEE LIVE OWLS AND LEARN ABOUT THESE SECRETIVE BIRDS OF PREY

Saturday, September 29, 2012 11:00 AM Breakheart Visitor's Center, Saugus

SAVE is pleased to sponsor this very special event. <u>Eyes On Owls</u> and naturalist Marcia Wilson will be at the <u>Breakheart Visitor's Center</u> at <u>11:00 AM</u> on <u>SATURDAY</u>, <u>SEPTEMBER 29</u>, <u>2012</u> to present a live owl program: "Who's Watching You? Owls of the World."

All who attend are in for some fun with educational close-up views of these secretive birds of prey. Wilson introduces the audience to owls found in New England as well as other parts of the world. A slide show begins the program by showcasing colorful wildlife photos by her husband, Mark Wilson. Marcia imitates the owls' calls herself, paying special attention to the more common owls that we might encounter in our area. After a hooting lesson and much audience participation, Marcia brings out the live owls one at a time. With each owl perched securely on her gloved hand, she walks out among the audience with six or seven owls. There's plenty of time for close-up views, photos and questions.

Each owl presented has a permanent disability which prevents him or her from surviving on their own in the wild. These non-releasable owls are legally permitted by state and federal agencies for use in environmental educational programs.

Which owl eats skunks? Can a little detective work reveal where owls live near you? What do pellets tell us about an owl's diet, the food chain and the web-of-life? How can we protect owls and their habitats? Wilson explores these questions and more during this fun, interactive program.

ATTENTION MEMBERS – ALERT REGARDING VOLCANO MULCHING

The Saugus Tree Committee wants to alert you to the following:

Mulch Volcanoes Kill!

As beneficial as mulch is, too much will kill trees and shrubs. Unfortunately, North America landscapers are falling victim to a plague of over- mulching.

More than 2 to 4 inches is over-mulching.

Piling up mulch up around the trunk or stem, in a "MULCH VOLCANO," will also kill the tree.

-Continuous moisture on the trunk will cause cankers and splits, and allow disease and pests to attack!

-Excess moisture in the root zone will stress the plant and cause root rot! -Thick blankets of mulch can become matted and eventually PREVENT water and air from getting to the roots! -The problems go on and on

Do it right! Proper Mulching

-Check depth of mulch. If two to four inches is already there, just rake to refresh and break up mats.

-If mulch is piled against the trunk or stem, pull it back several inches so that the base of the trunk and stem crown is exposed.

-Apply a 2 to 4 inch layer. Do not place mulch near the trunk. Mulch out to the tree's drip line or beyond.

-Keep mulch flat, not mounded, so that water will not run off.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO: REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE

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BOTTLE BILL BATTLE, CONTINUED

MASSPIRG reports that, despite unprecedented and overwhelming public support (77%), the Massachusetts Legislature failed to pass the Updated Bottle Bill before their session ended on July 31.

As a result of tremendous support from the public, together with 208 cities and towns that passed resolutions, 90+ local and state organizations, 360 small businesses, and activists and allies from all walks of life, the Senate included the bottle bill update in its version of the jobs bill as part of the budget. The House did not. The Joint Conference Committee, which reconciled the differences between the House and Senate Jobs bill, filed its conference report, which struck the amendment.

Janet S. Domenitz, MASSPIRG Executive Director, stated: "In my 30+ years doing this work, I've never seen such broad and deep support for any legislative measure. ... When asked by a reporter what's next, I told him: "We're looking at all the options, except one: giving up."

And so the battle continues...

REMEMBER: As each of us looks back through the years at the diligence and commitment of SAVE members since our organization's inception, we also look forward to continued vitality and dedication to SAVE's founding principles, with special emphasis on the two themes of "THINK GLOBALLY, ACT LOCALLY" and "REDUCE, REUSE, AND RECYCLE" that have been a common thread throughout SAVE's history.
